EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. Coleraine Borough Council is committed to fulfilling its responsibilities under Section 75 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998. In its Equality Scheme the Council gave an undertaking to carry out an Equality Impact Assessment on each policy or group of co-joined policies where screening had indicated significant issues in relation to one or more of the nine equality dimensions.
2. Access to and provision of Council's outdoor sports facilities and sports development programmes was identified as one such policy and following consultation was scheduled to be addressed. The stated aim of the Policy is "To promote the well being of the community by providing access to and participation in recreation; through the provision of outdoor sports facilities and sports development programmes."
3. The Equality Impact Assessment was carried out by Council Officers in accordance with the Practical Guidance on Equality Impact Assessments issued by the Equality Commission for Northern Ireland.
4. In carrying out the Equality Impact Assessment, Council has taken into account information and data from a number of sources. These sources suggest that Council's access to outdoor sports facilities and sports development programmes had been generally well received albeit it was known there were some emerging concerns which had been identified in the screening process. Council, in order to promote equality of opportunity and good relations, felt it was important to review the policy objectives and the operational management policy to explore these concerns and ascertain if there were any adverse impacts.
5. Qualitative and Quantitative data was sought from the following sources:
 - Sports Development Officers' Network
 - Meetings with local Sports Clubs
 - The National Playing Fields Association
 - Relevant Local Sports Leagues
 - Relevant Governing Bodies of Sport
 - Sports Council Northern Ireland
 - Coleraine Sports Council
 - The Institute of Leisure and Amenity Management
 - The Institute of Sport and Recreation Management
 - Coleraine Development and Planning Service (Mr. Jonathan McNee)
 - Departmental Facilities Audit, Sport, Leisure & Recreation 2004

In addition Council wrote to groups informing them that they were at the data collection stage of the process and would be grateful for any input they would like to contribute. An advertisement was also placed in the local media.

6. General Outdoor Sports Provision

According to the National Playing Fields Association, the minimum per 1000 population of outdoor sport pitched provision is 1.6 hectares and in relation to Coleraine equates to 38.16 hectares minimum. The actual outdoor sport pitched provision in Coleraine is 72.38 hectares, resulting in 32.22 hectares to the good. 80% of those involved at the information gathering stage were pleased with the amount of outdoor sport pitched provision. However, dissatisfied responses were received re: the provision for gaelic sports, athletics and equestrian. Whilst two of these may not be classified as a Section 75 issue, the provision for gaelic sports may be i.e. (1) between persons of different religious belief & (2) political opinion.

7. Sports Development Programmes

The sourced data, qualitative and quantitative, suggests that Council's policy aim on access to sports development programmes, its policy objectives and operational policies do not have an adverse or differential effect on any of the nine Section 75 categories. The data only suggests that the current sports development programme should be extended to cover identified particular sports. This is a service provision issue rather than a Section 75 issue and will be progressed as such.

There is also clear evidence that where some sports are generally self sufficient e.g. traditionally affluent sports such as rugby and cricket there has not been the same level of attention afforded them as, for example soccer. This is not a Section 75 issue; rather it is a question borne out of years of logical patterns in high demand sports that has shaped Council's priorities and policies throughout its lifespan.

8. Access to Outdoor Sports Facilities

The sourced data, both qualitative and quantitative, did however suggest that Council's policy aim on access to outdoor sports facilities, its policy objectives and operational policies may have an adverse or differential effect on two of the nine Section 75 categories i.e. (1) between persons of different religious belief & (2) political opinion.

Most of the dissatisfied responses from the forum meetings were largely concerned with inequalities in the provision of outdoor sports access. It is possible to play 5-a-side football indoors in Coleraine Leisure Centre seven days per week but it is not possible to hire one of Council's outdoor pitches seven days per week. Bowls can be played at Portrush Recreation Grounds seven days per week but not at the Warren, Portstewart.

9. Mitigating Measures

(i) Gaelic sports

The specific Section 75 concerns about provision and access to gaelic sports and the more general 'service provision' concerns about provision and access to athletics and equestrian activities suggest that the current approach by Council to outdoor sports and sports development can be improved.

The current approach can be defined as 'responsive' albeit this responsive approach is limited by a number of the constraints identified in section 2.5 of this report.

Rather than simply be responsive, it is possible to develop a more structured and systematic approach to facility provision and development. The specific Section 75 concerns identified in this Equality Impact assessment and the more general service provision concerns can then both be addressed.

The mitigating proposals, developed around this more structured context, are thus as follows;

- Actual and potential demand for this sport in the Borough will be assessed with the relevant Governing Body and County Board as will the gap, if any, between demand and supply
- Council will work with all sports organisations in the Borough and governing bodies to identify options for improving the provision of sports facilities where there is more demand, or potential demand, than supply
- Council will work with funding bodies to identify sources to help fund this additional demand, mindful of its Section 75 duties. Specific proposals with significant funding implications will be brought to Council for decisions

(ii) Access to Outdoor Sports Facilities

Where Council can identify that there is a proven demand for access to sport seven days per week an extended opening rollout programme will be implemented. The pace of the rollout programme will take account of near neighbourhood sensitivities to extended opening.

10. The Council wishes to consult on the findings and mitigating proposals arising from the Equality Impact Assessment. With this objective in mind, the availability of this report will be published in the press and posted on the Council's website. In addition, a number of targeted consultation meetings will be arranged locally. The report can be made available in alternative formats on request. Enquiries should be made to Council's Sports Development Officer.

INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Section 75 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998 requires Coleraine Borough Council to carry out Equality Impact Assessments on policies where screening indicated that there may be implications in relation to one or more of the equality dimensions.
- 1.2 This report has been made available as part of the Formal Consultation Stage of the Equality Impact Assessment and Council would welcome any comments you may have on its contents.
- 1.3 Coleraine Borough Council wishes to consult on its Equality Impact Assessment with regard to Access to and Provision of Council's outdoor sports facilities and sports development programmes in accordance with paragraph 10 and 11 of its Equality Scheme. The consultation period will be 12 weeks. This report can be made available in alternative formats on request. Enquiries should be made to Council's Sports Development Officer

The closing date for comments is Friday 04 February 2005.

- 1.4 Section 75 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998 requires all public authorities when carrying out their functions, to have due regard to the need to promote equality of opportunity between nine categories of persons, namely:
 - between persons of different religious belief, political opinion, racial groups, age, marital status or sexual orientation
 - between men and women generally
 - between persons with a disability and persons without and
 - between persons with dependants and persons without

In addition, without prejudice to its obligations above, the Council shall in carrying out its functions, have regard to the desirability of promoting good relations between persons of different religious belief, political opinion or racial group.

- 1.5 Public Bodies in their Equality Schemes, approved by the Equality Commission, set out how they proposed to fulfill their statutory duties. Existing policies were screened to assess whether they impacted on the promotion of equality of opportunity or the duty to promote good relations using the following criteria:
 - Is there any evidence of higher or lower participation or uptake by different groups?
 - Is there any evidence that different groups have different needs?

- Is there an opportunity to promote equality of opportunity between the relevant different groups, either by altering the policy, or by working with others in government or in the larger community, in the context of the policy?
- Have consultations with relevant groups, organisations or individuals indicated that policies of that type create problems specific to any relevant groups.

1.6 Following this screening process and the associated consultation, Council developed a 5 year Equality Impact Assessment programme. This programme included Council's policy on Access to and Provision of Outdoor Sports Facilities and Sports Development Programmes, the subject of this Equality Impact Assessment.

1.7 The primary function of the Equality Impact Assessment is to determine the extent (if any) of differential impact with regard to Access to and Provision of Council's Outdoor Sports Facilities and Sports Development Programmes upon the relevant groups. If an adverse effect is identified, the Equality Impact Assessment must consider alternative or mitigating measures.

1.8 Consideration of Available Data and Research

The intention in this section is to consider available data and research to see how Access to and the Provision of Council's Outdoor Sports Facilities and Sports Development Programmes impacts upon the nine categories under Section 75. Assessing any adverse impacts of policies cannot be fully effective unless all quantitative and qualitative data is available and accessible. At the present time limited data is available to monitor the impact of the policy under review and Council may need to consider more effective monitoring systems.

With regard to the Policy there are three main strands:

- initial consultation which identifies those areas of the service which the community considers to be priorities
- consultation on the draft document before final approval
- the general availability of the final document

1.9 In undertaking the Equality Impact Assessment the Council followed the guidance issued by the Equality Commission (Practical Guidance on Equality Impact Assessments). The seven separate stages of the Equality Impact Assessment are:

1. Consideration of available data and research.
2. Assessment of Impacts.

3. Consideration of resources that might mitigate any adverse impacts and alternative policies that might better achieve the promotion of equality of opportunity.
4. Formal Consultation.
5. Decision by Public Authority.
6. Publication of results of the Equality of Impact Assessments.
7. Monitoring of Adverse Impact.

1.10 This document is being circulated for consultation and only contains the first three elements of the Equality Impact Assessment. The remaining stages will be undertaken following consideration of the feedback from stage 4 (formal consultation).

2.0 BACKGROUND

2.1 In the past, Council has been responsive rather than proactive with regard to its provision of outdoor sports facilities i.e. if sports clubs, associations or Governing Bodies made representation to Council Officer's re: the shortage of certain facility provision these Officer's investigated the situation and made recommendations to Council. In addition, some sports in the Borough have tended to be self sufficient in the provision of their own facilities e.g. rugby, cricket, shooting, equestrian, sailing and gaelic sports.

2.2 Council does have a structured sports development programme with defined priorities and associated actions i.e. Sports Development Plan for the Borough of Coleraine, April 2004 – March 2005

2.3 However, Council does not at present have a defined, structured and co-ordinated policy with regard to access to its outdoor sports facilities. Rather, over the years customs and practice have dictated when and where outdoor sports facilities were made available.

2.4 The out working of these unstructured policies results in situations such as (1) being able to book and therefore play 5-a-side football indoors seven days per week but being unable to book or play outdoor soccer seven days per week (2) the ability to play bowls or tennis at Portrush Recreation Grounds seven days per week but not participate in either sport at the Warren, Portstewart.

Constraints with regard to facility provision, sports development programmes and access are as follows:

(i) Provision of Facilities

- Availability of Land
- Capital Costs
- Reduction of Grant Aid
- Time
- Resources

(ii) Sports Development Programmes

- Cost
- Human Resources
- Community Interest
- Availability of Space

(iii) Access to Facilities

- Public Opinion
- Cost Implication

3.0 CONSIDERATION OF AVAILABLE DATA AND RESEARCH

3.1 Sourcing Data

The preliminary exercise by the Sports Development Officer identified the following potential sources of data:

- Local Sports Clubs
- Practices in other Northern Ireland District Councils
- Sports Governing Bodies

The full schedule of interest groups is listed in Appendix 1.

In November 2003 a letter was issued to these groups. This letter summarised the policies under review and informed the groups that Council was currently at the data collection stage of the process and would be grateful to have their input at an early stage. Any comments would be welcomed including general views, statistical data or simply evidence of personal experiences. If any group had access to or knew of any data that would assist in reviewing the policy, they were requested to provide details. Information could be submitted by post, fax, email or a meeting could be arranged if this would prove to be more suitable. It was stressed that this was an informal consultation to inform the assessment work and that there would also be a formal consultation period in 2004.

- 3.2 Eight responses were received from this exercise, six asking Council to consult with other bodies/agencies and two expressing their commitment to the promotion of equality:

1. A response from the Northern Ireland Committee, Irish Congress of Trade Unions requesting that they be sent a copy of the EQIA.
2. A response from the Northern Ireland Council for Voluntary Action requesting they be given the opportunity to participate in further consultation.
3. A response from Lisa Royale of NI Blind Sports requesting that she be formally consulted.
4. A response from Coleraine Standing Conference of Women's Organisations requesting that Coleraine Women's Forum be included in consultation.
5. A response from the Ulster Branch, Triathlon Ireland requesting that they be formally consulted.
6. A response from the Irish Bowling Association requesting the inclusion of the following clubs at the consultation stage: Brookgreen Bowling Club, Brook Street, Coleraine and Portstewart.
7. A response from the Irish Ladies' Golf Union, Northern District expressing their commitment to the promotion of equality
8. A response from the Golfing Union of Ireland, Ulster Branch expressing their commitment to the promotion of equality

3.3 In addition two open meetings were held with interest groups to help develop sources of data. These were:

Full minutes of the meetings are available on request. The following data expresses the views and opinions of the relevant groups:

Sports Development Officers' Network

The relevant data collected through the letters sent to 25 Sports Development Officers in Northern Ireland is as follows, there were 10 replies:

- Five of those Councils who replied allow access to outdoor sports facilities seven days per week
- Two of those Councils who replied do not allow access outright to outdoor sports facilities seven days per week
- One Council who replied allows access to outdoor sports facilities seven days per week at the discretion of the Director of Leisure
- One Council who replied allows access to outdoor sports facilities seven days per week only where clear evidence of need can be identified
- One Council who replied allows access to certain outdoor sports facilities seven days per week but no access to grass pitches seven days per week

Meetings with Local Sports Clubs

The relevant data collected at the two meetings held with the local sports clubs was as follows:

- Outdoor bowling is well provided for
- There is a lack of young people playing bowls, having access to equestrian sports and participating in athletics at local club level
- Inconsistency on seven day per week access regarding outdoor sports participation
- Current facility provision for athletics, gaelic and equestrian is inadequate
- The future development of golf would benefit from the construction of a purpose built driving range
- Possible demand for seven days per week access to Council's soccer pitches
- Council's present pricing structure is fairly reasonable
- Sports Development programmes are of a high standard and meet the needs of interested parties
- Increased access to grass soccer pitches would be beneficial to all local clubs
- Potential areas of concern could arise regarding access to outdoor sports facilities seven days per week

The National Playing Fields Association

The relevant data received from The National Playing Fields Association is as follows:

The minimum per 1000 population of outdoor sport pitched provision is 1.6 hectares and in relation to Coleraine equates to 38.16 hectares minimum.

Coleraine Development and Planning Service

The relevant data received from Coleraine Development and Planning Service is as follows:

The actual outdoor sport pitched provision in Coleraine is 72.38 hectares, resulting in 32.22 hectares to the good when compared to the National Playing Fields Association minimum standard of 38.16 hectares (based on 1.6 hectares per 1000 population)

4.1 Assessment of Impact - Summary of Data Evaluation

General Outdoor Sports Provision

The actual outdoor sport pitched provision in Coleraine is 72.38 hectares, resulting in 32.22 hectares to the good when compared with the minimum standards as identified by the National Playing Fields Association. 80% of

those involved at the information gathering stage were pleased with the amount of outdoor sport pitched provision. 20% of the representatives from the combined focus meetings would like to see more gaelic, equestrian and athletics facility provision. However, whilst two of these may not be classified as a Section 75 issue, the provision for gaelic sports may be i.e. (1) between persons of different religious belief & (2) political opinion.

Sports Development Programmes

The sourced data, qualitative and quantitative, suggests that Council's policy aim on access to sports development programmes, its policy objectives and operational policies do not have an adverse or differential effect on any of the nine Section 75 categories. The results of the forum meetings suggest a high level of satisfaction (67%) with Council's sports development programmes. The main exception would be from the local bowling clubs who would like to see more participation opportunities for the young people of the Borough. 40% of club representatives at the open forum meetings expressed a desire to work closer with the service.

There is also clear evidence that where some sports are generally self sufficient e.g. traditionally affluent sports such as rugby and cricket there has not been the same level of attention afforded them as, for example soccer. Again this is not a Section 75 issue; rather it is a question borne out of years of logical patterns in high demand sports that has shaped Council's priorities and policies throughout its lifespan.

In effect, the data suggests that Council should consult the relevant Governing Bodies of sport with regards to providing sports development programmes for sports in the Borough underrepresented at present e.g. basketball, table tennis and surfing. This is a service provision issue rather than a Section 75 issue and will be progressed as such.

Access to Outdoor Sports Facilities

The sourced data, both qualitative and quantitative, did however suggest that Council's policy aim on access to outdoor sports facilities, its policy objectives and operational policies may have an adverse or differential effect on two of the nine Section 75 categories i.e. (1) between persons of different religious belief & (2) political opinion.

Most of the dissatisfied responses from the forum meetings were largely concerned with inequalities in the provision of outdoor sports access. It is possible to play 5-a-side football indoors in Coleraine Leisure Centre seven days per week but it is not possible to hire one of Council's outdoor pitches seven days per week. Bowls can be played at Portrush Recreation Grounds seven days per week but not at the Warren, Portstewart.

5.0 MITIGATING MEASURES

(1) Gaelic sports

The specific Section 75 concerns about provision and access to gaelic sports and the more general 'service provision' concerns about provision and access to athletics and equestrian activities suggest that the current approach by Council to outdoor sports and sports development can be improved.

The current approach can be defined as 'responsive' albeit this responsive approach is limited by a number of the constraints identified in section 2.5 of this report.

Rather than simply be responsive, it is possible to develop a more structured and systematic approach to facility provision and development. The specific Section 75 concerns identified in this Equality Impact assessment and the more general service provision concerns can then both be addressed.

The mitigating proposals, developed around this more structured context, are thus as follows;

- Arrange consultation meetings with representatives of the particular interest groups
- This report can be made available, on request in alternative formats

The arrangements for consultation will be co-ordinated by Council's Sports Development Officer to whom all enquiries should be made.
